



GETTING INVOLVED – IN VICTORIA

As you have seen in the stories on Road to Refuge, refugees face complex and varied difficulties at all stages of their journeys. More often than not, these difficulties don't end upon reaching Australia, Many face gruelling conditions of indefinite detention and for those allowed into the community, they face navigating an expensive and foreign legal system, supporting a family on close to nothing, accessing healthcare and transport in a new country or starting school in a new language.

There are opportunities to provide support in many different ways – whether you have specific skills that can be put to use, or energy and passion to volunteer.

VOLUNTEERING

Many organizations run entirely on people like you volunteering their time. This is a great way to support refugees, learn more about the issues they face and build enduring relationships. You can employ your specific skills or volunteer your time in any way it's needed.
